## Long Awaited Update For Furcadia

On April 6th, Dragon's Eye Productions, the company behind Furcadia, released the first update for the game in over a year.

The 'Kitterwing' update for the game provides a number of new add-ons for characters and a series of 24-bit portraits. More updates were originally going to be available in the update – including 32-bit colour – however the popular MMORPG was hurried online to ensure that the program was compatible with the recently released Windows Vista. The game last year celebrated its tenth year online, and turned over a profit of \$1 million last year from selling sponsorships, avatar upgrades and gifts.

In similar gaming news, Wyrmkeep Entertainment's Inherit the Earth RPG has been made available for Pocket PC users. Versions for Windows, Mac and Linux have been available since 2004. www.furcadia.com

## Major Awards 2006

### May 2007 brought the results of not one, but two events in the furry fandom.

The first is the announcement of the renound Ursa Major Awards, this year presented at Califur 3. 53 nominees took battle to gain the rank of champion in each of 10 categories. And this year was dominated by popular Dreamworks movie Over the Hedge, which bagged two awards for Best Motion Picture and Best Dramatic Work or Series for Hammy's Boomerang Adventure. In the literary sections Kyell Gold left with three awards for novel Pendant of Fortune, short fiction Jacks to Open and Best Published Illustration, also for Pendant of Fortune (image by Sara Palmer).

## UC Davis Survey Published

This century has brought a great increase of interest in the furry fandom. With ever more media attention, a lot of people are looking to the fandom and wondering. At the time the first edition of the Furtean Times was thrown online there were two furry surveys floating around the internet. And now one of them. The one being conducted by the University of California, Davis Department of Psyhchology has been published.

The results are largely unsurprising. With an average age of 24.6 years. 89% of respondants were listed as "white," 81% male and 83% were resident or born of the United States. 37% classed themselves as bisexual, 33% hetrosexual, 26% homosexual and 8% other/unsure.

Another furry survey is currently waiting to be published. Held by Australian furry and psychology student Kyle Evans. He based his study off David Rust's The Sociology of the Furry Fandom; which has been ridiculed for what many consider to be great inaccuracies which have lead to some of the fandom's greatest stereotypes.

## WRKING THE FUR

When it comes to fursuits, most of those in the UK to own one have had it made by someone else. Most of those that make them are overseas, and charge a hefty fee for shipping. So how many furs in the UK have even tried to make their own. The answer is not many.

As someone who has, themself, taken on many commissions, (some of which are still in progress), it surprised me to find that about one in thirty furs on these islands have tried their paw at making a full blown fursuit. We're talking like the picture in the bottom right, not simple paws, tail and/or ears. Can it really be that hard to make something to wear? Believe it or not the answer is yes!

Stores that sell fur don't appear in many places in the UK, and getting hold of quality fur or the colour you want can be almost impossible. Even if you have the fur, most people don't want to take the time out to cutit and sew it. I'm not saying they're lazy, but making a mistake can cost time, fur and of course money. If this is the case however, then why do some still try their paw at making one? The answer for me (I'm not sure of others) is personal. By that, I mean it has a more sentimental value because you made it yourself. I feel the same about some of the commission pieces I have made before, and feel sad to see it go, as there is a good chance I'll never see or hear of it again.

Now some people who read this will wonder how you can be so attached to something that isn't alive. You really have to watch this creature take shape from flat foam and sheets of fur, into a full animal costume that someone will bring to life. Don't forget that once you're in suit, you are that character, which makes it as alive as the wearer. Meaning that a limp performance will leave little to the imagination of those around.

We'll step away from that though, this is about constructing, not performing. Yet maybe they're quite similar. A good fursuit that you feel comfortable in, can help you give a better performance. Saying that, what could make you feel more comfortable than knowing you made the fursuit that you're wearing. Faux furs are readily available from eBay if there isn't a store nearby, as well as

foam, hotglue, spray glue, carpet tiles and rubber mats (for the sole of the foot-paws). Patterns for costumes are also available, and full instructions means that pretty much everyone can use them.

There are a few things to think about when it comes to making a fursuit though. 1) It will take some time to make, so have some free time set aside. 2) It will cost money, though how much depends on what you want. 3) Knowing your limits is key. If you feel tired, or bored then take a break. Just make sure to unplug your hotglue gun...

Tutorials are widely available on the internet for things like head and foot-paw construction. There are even some for padding if your suit is to be fat, muscled or even the opposite gender. Having an image to go by so you know what you want it to look like helps too. It doesn't have to be expensive commissioned work, you should see the sketches I use to check my work, yikes!

Whether it's a fursuit for you or someone else, when it has to fit closely, you can't have too

many measurements...within reason at least. Often you can just modify a paper pattern.
Or make up a poly-cotton body suit, and pin it closer to the body of whoever will be wearing the finished item. This is often the best method, but remember that although fur has a little give, a tight suit will cause problems.

If you're dead set on saving yourself time, and trouble then commissioning would be better. However I still don't think anything can beat a suit you made yourself.

Chances are you've seen Disney's 'Robin Hood' at least once, right?

Right. Furry Characters in the popular or public realm! There is, and has been, a perhaps startling wealth of such anthropomorphised beasts since the very dawn of cinema and the golden, dawning age of the 'cartoon' - Mickey Mouse, Bugs Burny, Tom and Jerry - for over seventy years we've been entertained by a humongous host of sleek, spiny, fluffy, feisty, quick-heeled and generally loveable characters, and in an age when the furry subculture appears to be merely at its true dawning, the centenary for such beasties doesn't seem like such a difficult target to swing a hit at.

Thus, here it is. The 50 Greatest Furry Characters as voted by YOU, the Furtean Times readers, the staff, members of DeviantArt and FurAffinity – from the realms of film, of cartoon, of comic and even possibly of your own creations. Who will nab crown of all-time greatest fur? Will they be righteous in their grasping of the golden fleece? Hell, I already know.

#### Baloo The Jungle Book

Kicking off the list at the lowest rung is every man-cub's bosom buddy, the affable and impossibly-unlovable Baloo, the central stooge and main player of Disney's 30s classic The Jungle Book. Whilst Baloo's clout in current climates feels slightly weaker than what he used to bear over at least three generations, this fun, though quietly philosophical and gentle giant showed Mowgli the ways of the jungle.

#### Snoopy Peanuts/Charlie Brown

Pick up your jaw. One of the world's best-loved, best-recognised and arguably most-merchandised fictional carrines has finished barely inches above Kipling's hulking Baloo, though again, his inclusion alone is worth the weight he bears. Snoopy's

just your average beagle... till he lets his imagination get the better of him. A pilot, a scout-master, a tennis star and ace blockbuster scriptwriter, Snoopy's life stretches far and beyond what his downtrodden master Charlie Brown could ever imagine. Quick-witted, satirical and forever a dog of equal leisure and japery, the eternal beagle's mastery was perhaps overshadowed by the anarchic clout of Garfield in his later years – but like hell that he'd be left forgotten. Almost ten years on, the world is still missing the great Charles Schulz. Kicked the crap outta Fred Freakin' Basset...

#### Lola Bunny Looney Tunes

It has to be said, the creation and inclusion of Lola Burny into 1997's big-screen knockabout, Space Jam, was one that was both overdue, and even slightly epoch-making. The inclusion of a major female role into the Looney franchise had not been realised up until this point (whilst Tiny Toons had been doing it since the early 90s), and given the equal-opportunity basis on which the latter quarter of the 20th century adhered to, it was both high time and indeed a good time to incorporate Lola into Bugs' bachelor life. We haven't seen much of her since SJ, but chances are she'll not go down forgotten in a swift hurry.

#### Yakko, Wakko and Dot Animaniacs

Okay, that's three characters, technically. But you'll never, ever, see this trio apart. They just wouldn't operate. Whilst what EXACTLY they are is a factor that's never quite surpassed being hazy to a point, Yakko, Wakko and Dot were an essential staple of what became one of the, if not THE greatest Saturday morning cartoons of all time. Working entirely on a tireless basis of pastiche, Groucho-wit and old-timey slapstick, the Warner Brothers and Sister brought Saturday morning cartoons a touch of vaudeville class and satire that had been missing from screens for years on end. One of the few shows which appeals to almost every generation living in some faction or other, the trio may operate on being intensely annoying, but unbearably and tirelessly agreeable at the same time.

#### Yoshi Mario Brothers

Yoshi is one of the few characters born out of the cult market into popular culture who no one seems to fail to recognise. Mario's green, bouncy, endlessly-happy dinosaur chum brought a sense of furry charm to Nintendo's franchise with his debut in the groundbreaking Super Mario World; and has remained both ageless and as charm-filled as he was when he first started chomping berries back in 1991. Inevitably, Yoshi outgrew Mario's shadow and branched out into a series of other titles, the pick of the crop being the sublime Yoshi's Island, which was released a decade ago as one of the last truly good Super Nintendo titles to be released. Whilst Yoshi now seems content to remain one of Mario's many, MANY understudies in various multiplayer jaunts, his doglike charm and doe-eyed naivety hands Spyro the Dragon all he ever wanted to be on the shiniest of silver plates.

#### Fritz the Cat Fritz the Cat

Fritz the Cat broke several boundaries as soon as he hit the printing press. The cult American artist Robert Crumb's brainchild and piece de resistance, Fritz was born a weapon of satire, of drugs, sex, and of burgeoning sleaze in and around the Big City. Whilst Crumb's comics have often been lauded as cult masterpieces and classics in their own right, the two animated features that were born out of the feline's underground popularity have consistently been given a thorough 'meh' in comparison. Regardless, the first FTC picture was the first-ever animated feature to receive the big'R' certificate in the US, featuring, given its appearance in the 1970s, the world's first true look at 'yiff' in what remains a very raw, unashamedly visceral set of scenes built to challenge censorship laws and to twist the conventions of the society Crumb was somewhat accurately satirising. To this day, it seems no animated feature, nor series, has matched the controversy Fritz courts with inimitable flair.

#### M DTESET FEAL

Salem Sabrina the Teenage Witch
Okay, scream all you like. Salem HIGHER than
Fritz the Cat? Maybe a little controversial, but nevertheless a tough allocation. Salem was, for many,
the key reason a lot of people found the live-action
Sabrina TV show quite as watchable as it was. Sure,
animatronics weren't NEW, Gremlins had been out
a good 7 or 8 years by the time Melissa Joan Hart
strutted her way off Clarissa Explains It All into her
arguably more popular role as Sabrina, but... there
was something about that blatantly puppeteered,
wisecracking cat that had the exact same voice as
Norbert the beaver. Salem provided the show with
his role as the self-obsessive wit, the bored, sarcastic apprentice to Sab's teen melodramas, and left his

mark as one of the only arguably cool characters to be seen on an American teen-orientated comedy for

donkey's years (Carlton Banks and Kenan Thomp-

Inevitably, the top 50 surges ahead with the debut of the first and ONLY Pokemon to appear on the chart, kicking a certain yellow mouse into cretinous touch. Whilst many far and wide may deride Pokémon and its unfeasibly gigantic franchise from hell, for a time many of us were captivated by the sheer thrill of being able to 'collect' animals and making 'em fight 'til they 'fainted' through a variety of turn-based HP-lowering attacks and manoeuvres. One of the undeniably cooler varieties of Pokemon was the enigmatic yet ever-intimidating Flareon face-on, a fennec on fire, but to those in the know, the evolutionary outcome of an Eevee blessed with a fire stone – whilst I myself forever prefer Pupitar as per my choice of fighting beastie, as far as furry characters go I believe Flareon's a nifty choice to make from the gazillions now at your disposal thanks to Game Freak and Creature's endless programming talents and marketing skills.

#### Any Rose Sonic the Hedgehog

Amy, the archetypal unrequited lovesick puppy of any true saga, made her debut quietly via the ground-breaking Sonic CD as Sonic's damsel in distress, his first since taking on Robotnik and his endless minions from hordes of games preceding. To this date Amy, one of the more distinguishable characters from her bright pinkishness and ruddy great mallet, has remained Sonic's feisty admirer, making no secret about her wanting for his rescue once again... in recent years, Sonic has shown little sign of surrendering to Amy's tomboyish charms, with a human maiden in tow in his most recent gaming venture, and for those remaining true to the SatAM cartoon series and Archie comics, Sally Acom.

#### Fiver Watership Down

Watership Down remains one of the world's bestknown and loved children's books and animated films despite its visceral detail and unflinching scenes of anti-censorship – the tale of 'rabbits versus mankind and another bunch of rabbits and a dog' has become an archetypal staple of many an upbringing, with the determined psychic, Fiver, being the driving force of the entire plot. Had Fiver, a young and incredibly impressionable young rabbit, not foreseen the destruction of his clan's burrows and gone with his heart in helping lead his somewhat sceptical troupe towards the fabled Watership Down, death for all would have been more than certainty... Fiver represents bravery in an odd form, though the message of 'be true to what you believe in' could not be more obvious in this lowly rabbit's courteous valiance.

#### Falco Lombardi Star Fox

If there were ever a furry character outside of Garfield to deserve the title of 'biggest and most anarchic cynic', Fox McCloud's second-in-command on board Team StarFox and resident necessary maverick – Falco Lombardi – would strut away with the spoils, muttering that he both deserved it, and that in actuality it means 'very little to him'. From the debut of Star Fox upon the Super Nintendo back in

the early 1990s, Arwing maestro Falco's lack of workmate compassion and sense of 'brotherhood' was more than made up for in his technical prowess and do-or-die attitude. Making up the avian quarter of the original team, surly Lombardi was sadly absent from Gamecube launcher Star Fox Adventures, but still pleasingly present within every Fox Follower's consciousness. And lemme tell you, he kicked some prime arse in his surprise reincarnation via Super Smash Bros. Melee, too.

#### Shadow the Hedgehog Sonic the Hedgehog

Shadow, within the uber-expansive franchise that is the Sonic universe, has perhaps taken off in popularity a little more than once expected. Created as essentially an anti-Sonic and foil to both good and evil forces within the Mobian war, Shadow essentially took on Knuckles the Echidna's previous role as mysterious patriarch of neutrality and drifterism; even seen wielding a gun, and a perpetually unsure expression plastered across his face. Whilst the jury may always be out on Shadow's place in the balance of good versus evil, one thing's for certain – no fool gets in the way of him finding out this for himself

#### Sabrina Sabrina Online

Sabrina Online, which has been running a good eleven years, cannot be ruled out as never having made a mark upon the fandom and how it operates. Artist Eric Schwartz's eponymous heroine and central lead is one of clear, contextual and quirkworthy intelligence, right down to her preoccupation with the Amiga (something with which Schwartz himself is hardly a stranger). She typifies the high school geek, and parries it away against her porn-video-magnate-boss, the outlandish Zig Zag, with the power of making opposites work against each other. Whilst she is typically not best known in absolute public consciousness, her furpopularity renders her statuesque enough to place her 38th in this here all-time list.

#### Felicia Darkstalkers

For a while, until import-mania grabbed everyone by the goolies, the beat-em-up of beat-em-ups, on any gaming format, was Street Fighter 2. Could've said what you'd've liked, everything else was mere imitation – even the once shining Mortal Kombat franchise fell scrutiny to being weighed up against Ryu and co., despite blatant differences between the two series of games being incredibly easy to see. For a while, many believed all Capcom ever produced were the aforementioned SF and many, many Rockman/Megaman games until the turn of the decade – when the team fought back with the long-since-lauded arcade franchise, Darkstalkers. Though the series of games are instantly comparable to the SF engine and bear striking resemblances to the SF3 franchise, Darkstalkers brought with it Felicia – the epitome of the anime 'catgirl', only with a backstory to explain why she appears as she does...i.e. with a ruddy great tail and fangs and whatnot. Whilst the internet community may have more of a soft spot for Felicia as essentially 'eye candy' before any more substantial; Felicia highlights an important move in the history of the furry coming nearer into the public focus, and is thus an important piece of history in her own right.

#### Mewn Funny Farm

Funny Farm is a webcomic that's been around long enough to be considered one of the pioneers of the 'furry boom' of the 1990s; and is well-read and loved enough to be missed by a legion of readers. The strip works on the simple 'odd couple' basis, pairing up a logical, organised and on-the-occasion sarcastic canine, Ront, and his fellow boarding house co-owner, the lovable, laid-back Mewn. Mewn represents the archetypal 'stooge' of any comedic act, and whilst he is not entirely devoid of intelligence is portrayed as the least mature of the varied cast of furs and humans within the strip. Despite several 'furry boom' webcomic characters having sadly missed out on hitting the top 50, Mewn's carefree edge has carried him through as an adequate representative for the expansive realm of the webcomic here at #36.

#### Pink Panther The Pink Panther

Whilst blatantly having little to do with the Peter Sellers films apart from having the clumsy Clouseau obtaining his own mini-show alongside him, Pink's inclusion in the top 40 would have been criminal to avoid. With a theme tune and opening sequence that everyone over the age of at least ten old is aware of, the cunning-yetsurprisingly-unlucky rinky-dink panther has been entertaining for what must be coming on to seventy years. Forever silent, this bipedal puss spoke to us through his physical scheming and hilariously theatrical day-to-day life, whilst never losing an inch of charm despite his many comeuppances. Pink's position on the scene has dwindled to the extent that these days he is merely 'nostalgic', with the decision back in the 1990s to give him a new, trendier series, and Rob Paulsen's voice, perhaps contributing to this derailment slightly. I'd also like to blame Steve Martin, just because I can.

#### Jenna Grape Macropod Madness

Another webcomic player, Jenna Grape is perhaps the best-known counterpart of Kelvin the Lion's phenomenally successful online webstrip, Macropod Madness – another stalwart since the 'furry boom' of the nineties. Whilst the comics perhaps revolve more around high fantasy actionadventure than the majority of other furry webcomics out on the market, this fails to stop it being both consistently entertaining, and remarkably popular – also notably, Jenna's stomping-ground has been known to elude to several sub-subcultures of the fandom in the past, perhaps most obviously revolving around fatfur and babyfur-related escapades in the past.

#### Meeko Pocahontas

Known as the silent comical lead of Disney's best-known Native American princess, Meeko is perhaps the best-known racoon character outside of the C are Bears fandom – at such a point in time when furriness was still a new concept for the public eye to be viewing, Meeko was a surprisingly salient and fan-winning character, so much that to this day he is still revered to such an extent that a 'meekometer', a system of measuring the size of plushies, has wormed its way into furspeak.

#### Sylvester Looney Tunes

Sylvester, alike fellow failure in Looney Tunesrelated questings, rarely ever triumphs against his diminutive foil, Tweety Pie – in fact, he's only ever 'won' once – but this makes the bumbling housecat all the more likeable. If Tom Cat could talk, he wouldn't talk like Sylvester (lisp and all), but chances are they'd share similar temper tantrums. Unlike Wile E and Tom however, Sylvester is perhaps slightly dimmer than his fellow cartoon counterparts – a terrific bumbler and lovable stooge to boot, we all know that should Sylvester ever come out on top more than once, he'd lose his charm. The eternal cockiness and belief in his striving attempts to eat that ruddy bird makes this 'puddy tat' such an essential furry character that he trounces Tweety in knocking him clean of the top 50!

#### Fifi Lafume Tiny Toon Adventures

Not especially one of Tiny Toons' biggest players, Fifi LaFume harbours a lucrative fan audience through the furry community perhaps more so than any other character to have come out of the show pourquoi? Pepe Le Pew, arguably one of Warner Bros' most memorable characters, has evidently passed on his French charm and infallible dignity through the family line, with Fifi as a female, younger version showing the Pew-Fume traits through her sense of style, her flair for life and her adamance in knowing that she's utterly wonderful. A disappointingly underused character in the series, Fifi makes up for the jaw-dropping lack of Plucky or Hampton on this fine list.

#### O UTTER TENIA

Darkwing Duck Darkwing Duck "Let's get dangerous!" Entering to what is perhaps the greatest cartoon title theme beneath Duck Tales and Heathcliff, Disney took the aforementioned 'Tales' formula and spun it inside out with a sense of mystery, action and high adventure at the hands of the nattily-dressed yet slightly-incompetent-inan-Inspector-Gadget-sense Darkwing Duck, helped along by the even dozier yet equally lovable Launchpad (the big pilot dude from Duck Tales) as a essential assistant. DD, whilst obviously borrowing a little from DIC's Gadget in more than one way, heralded a rise in the popularity of Disney's Sat AM lineups, borrowing a lot of wit and slapstick techniques from rival animation moguls Warner Bros – however, this worked to an awesome advantage. One of the few Disney serials to run without having a preceding animated film, Darkwing Duck remains deep within the memories and hearts of those who grew up in the mid-90s, amongst those sodding Power Rangers and collectable cardboard discs.

#### Jenny Bucky O'Hare and the Toad Wars

Jenny, first-name-only, was a cat on board the good team O'Hare, providing female lead to central hero Bucky and sensible foil to the manic Deadeye Duck. Jenny's role does not look entire dissimilar to Star Fox's Krystal (in fact, both series bear somewhat similar cast set-ups all around) – though, a shared difference in the sense that, unknown to her crew but one Willy DuWitt, Jenny has hidden, psychic abilities... shh! Perhaps the runner-up in the 'Foxiest Feline' stakes, with Cleo of the Catillac Cats scoring just more points to inch ahead. Even so, Jenny's fan following is hardly understated.

Gadget Hackwrench Chip 'n' Dale's Rescue Rangers Within Rescue Rangers, perhaps one of the most undeservedly underrated Saturday cartoons of all time, had the classic gallery of characters and personalities in the roster - Chip, the surly-yet-earnest one, Dale, the goofy-yet-lovableone, Monterey Jack, the fat cheese fetishist, Zipper, the quiet, consistently alert guy at the back and, ultimately, Gadget, the smart, sensible one with the majority of the plans up her tiny sleeves. Face it. If it weren't for Gadget's involvement in the Rangers' crime-solving, all that would happen is that one would have a nervous breakdown whilst the others farted about in disarray. All there is to it. Gadget is the vital cog in this superb shows machine.

#### Timon Timon and Pumbaa

Sadly, his dopey warthog friend is nowhere to be seen in the top fifty, and perhaps MORE shockingly, the only other LK character to get anywhere near was the fearsome Scar, who fell at the final hurdle at an impossibly unlucky #51. By-the-by, Timon's place is thoroughly deserved, as he's not only the only meerkat to feature in our chart. Timon is sassy, strident and goal-seeking - he's the plot-driver and the hyperactive nut, the go-getter and resident emo, the brains and the beauty – given that he's paired up with Pumbaa, these traits are hardly hard to attain, but instead of being a hard-case to Pumbaa's soft, endearing side, Timon too has a pathetic, lovable streak, to the extent that we want him to succeed in everything he valiantly and persistently strives for in life. Thankfully, he often does!

#### Babs Bunny Tiny Toon Adventures

Babs Burny probably takes after Bugs far more than the lower-octane Buster Burny does – to the extent that sitting down for more than three seconds without pastiching something, or ridiculing her nemeses, would prove an impossible task. Babs has an enormous imagination, and whilst her cohort Buster makes up for the majority of the wit and the sly of Tiny Toons' core, Babs provides the majority of the wacky soul that keeps the show afloat. Clearly a figure that the Animaniacs found inspira-

tional, Babs is undoubtedly a character many would fail to forget in a hurry.

#### Sally Acorn Sonic the Hedgehog

In at #25 comes an archetypal female fur, and perhaps the best-known squirrel outside of Tufty and Rocket I (both of whom are notably absent from the list) – some may say Sally's appearance in the master list has come a little low, but alas, the people have spoken! Before Sonic X and the nu-gen games. erased most memories of the glory days of the Sonic franchise, Princess Sally Acorn was the blue fiend's right-hand royal, taking on the brainwork and the technical aspects that Sonic himself found too slow or time-consuming – as a team, the duo worked on an 'I'll do the math, you do the legwork' basis, and suffice to say it worked wonders! Their relationship has been will-they-won't-they and up and down for donkey's years, but alas it seems fate is destined to draw these infinitely different furs together.

#### Jack Jack

Despite his job, his sour appearance and his morbid fascination, Jack, a sin personified from the underworld, is ultimately a fatherly, guiding soul – helping those who need guidance through the murky sewers of the afterlife find their way amongst the temptations of going back to the overworld, or to succumb to what fate demands... a frank, marvellously-arted and genuinely touching webcomic, Jack is one of the few characters that many may have never heard of, or have forgotten about, but is still one whom every furcannot afford to idly dismiss. His place within the top 25 is thoroughly justified. Plus, UNCANNILY, seeing the number '24' next to 'Jack' brings up pictures of Kiefer Sutherland. MAKE IT STOP.

Whilst the Misty website isn't functioning too well at the minute, her presence within the minds and memories of many a fur is hard to delete – and I myself am only just discovering her world... get back to me next year when I've looked through the archives!

#### Daffy Duck Looney Tunes

When he's happy, he bounces all over the place. When he's angry... he's livid. In a Donald Duckish sense, Daffy is an irritable, grouchy old sod, primarily sick of that damn wabbit getting all the hooks and the shares in the limelight. Were Daffy an inch more curning, perhaps enough to outweigh Bugs in intellectual skill, he may one day be able to win a feud without his beak getting twisted the other way round. #### Dr. John Zoidberg Futurama

Dr. Zoidberg is wonderful. Seriously, he's an absolute treasure. The Decapodian Lobster-creature from the year 3000 is steadily employed as a physician (albeit an incompetent one) for the delivery company Planet Express, where he is constantly ridiculed and undermined by his fellow employees that his status as 'lowly' became an in-gag by season three of Futurama. Zoidberg, ultimately, has a massive heart beneath that hard shell and often confused brain, and beyond that pseudo-Jewish accent that he flips and flops about almost as if he were Groucho's dimmer half only makes him more appealing. Consistently Futurama's crowdpuller outside of the freight train of gaggery that is Bender Bending Rodriguez, Dr. Zoidberg misses out on the top twenty barely, but deservedly clings onto 21st, shockingly knocking the archetypal Daffy of Duckington back into 22nd.

#### MINERVA MINK Animaniacs

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the top ten? Hmm, maybe. Minerva Mink was such a controversial character for a Saturday morning show that she was vetoed out of most of the episodes, leaving her buxom selfin amere two segments in the Animaniacs' history. So how did such a brief yet incredibly provocative character manage to stay within the minds of the furs of today to the extent that she finishes above ruddy Garfield? Firstly, Google Images. Secondly, search her. Thirdly, it's hard to forget, at the age of say, nine or ten, a segment based around a big-chested, blonde-haired mink on what appeared to be very, VERY hot heat. Hell, I voted for her. Kudos!

#### ROBIN HOOD Robin Hood

Ah, reliant Robin, undoubtedly manys first taste of furriness, and undoubtedly the absolute favourite to top this list – he hasn't! OMG! But all is not lost. Taking the tale of the valiant Robin and kitting him out as a daring, charismatic fox from the forests of deepest Nottingham was a brave, and ultimately very fruitful move – in one of Disney's best-known movies, it's surprising Robin's legend hasn't grown to the extent as it has in the furry domain, but nevertheless, picture this – up until I told him otherwise, my housemate always believed Robin Hood was actually a fox, and that the BBC adaptation of the legend was merely a human re-writing of the furry cartoon. He cannot be escaped...

#### KRYSTAL Star Fox

A relatively new character to the fandom, Krystal made her debut as the long-running Star Fox franchise's first female lead, debuting in the Gamecube's much-underrated platform-action adventure, Star Fox Adventures. The sassy-though-hyper-intelligent femme fatale to Fox McCloud's raging masculinity, Krystal perhaps borrows a little from former femfurs such as Minerva Mink or the High Priestess Cleo (and don't you FREAKIN' FORGET IT) in terms of her balance within the fabric of the plot, and ultimately seems well-

aligned with Sally Acom and Jenny in terms of personality – but there's a crucial difference, and that's in the sense that Krystal could quite easily challenge Fox for leadership of the team Star Fox! She is one of the few 'fighters' on this list, and rather than being 'eye candy' alone, Krystal kicks some serious arse. I mean, really. If Fox put his gun down for a SECOND, and they were to brawl for who gets the leadership... to the girl goes the spoils!

#### MILES 'TAILS' PROWER Sonic

Every hero has a second-in-command, and Tails is perhaps the best-known of them all, to the extent that his own fanbase through means of Internet or otherwise is fairly astronomical. The young, naive and consistently trouble-encapsulated young kitsune is notable not only for being the world's best-known understudy and thus perhaps the first to break through of his overstudy's reins, but for a time, was the clear leader of this poll - controversial? I doubt it. Tails seems to be beloved by all, and known by almost as many – chances are, if Sonic didn't get you into the fandom, Tails will've done. Gone are the days when you could merely follow behind whoever friend was playing as Sonic on the second pad – but sadly, the days when Tails has an annoyingly docile voice sadly aren't. Regardless, the fact that he can pilot such machines at such a young age is definitely worthy of plus points, and signs th<mark>at he's a</mark> Fox McCloud in the making.

#### FOX McCLOUD Star Fox

In 1991, the world of videogaming unarguably changed for good - the Super Nintendo, or SNES for short, signalled the explosion of 16-to-32-bit games, with Super Mario World heralding the march. In a brief time later, Nintendo took a weighty dare in launching the 'Super FX' chip - arguably the first glimpse at 3D console gamers had ever gotten – and with it came Star Fox, and its team of (perhaps even further revolutionary) furs. Enter Fox McCloud = heroic, respectable and downright sexeriffic to go with it – leader and prime Arwing pilot of the jet fighter sent to rid the galaxy of the megalomaniac Andross and search for his long-since missing father James. Fox's clout as a furry idol would not half be the punch it packs until the launch of StarFox Adventures on the Gamecube, where for the first time the vulpine was able to venture beyond his claustrophobic arwing, and onto a planet where one-on-one combat would become a new, necessary means... and he'd find sexual tension with our 4th greatest furry character, Krystal. In a top 5 dominated by foxes, the eponymous McCloud tops his fellow vulpes somewhat suitably, and is perhaps the most oft underrated of the trio.

#### SONIC

Sonic the Hedgehog Surprised? Maybe not. It's hardly inexplicable that the world's best-known videogame character (topping Mario), be it through comics, cartoons or mere fandomage, has sped his way up to the top of our list, suitably being crowned The Furtean Time's Greatest Furry Character of All Time. What is it about the spiky blue blur that has made him such an enduring, encapsulating character from the days of 16-bit gaming, entrenched sixteen years into the past? Despite Sega's downfall and a stoop in critical plaudits for his most recent game appearances, how has the wisecracking, fearless nocturne from Mobius (or is it Earth?) managed to stay atop of his game for the good part of a lot of our lifetimes? This question is possibly one to be posed for another article, but at the very least we can surmise that Sonic is arguably the best-known furry character in popular and fandom culture, and is at such a height in underground and internet cultism that there's categories for 'Sonic Characters' on various internet art depositories. He is inavoidable, indefatigable, and I've never met anyone who's never played as Sonic in one form or another at least ONCE. This is testament; let it ring, as to why Sonic the Hedgehog is the Greatest Furry Character of All Time.
